COMMITTEE For SPECIAL EDUCATION Northwest Education Services Guidelines for SEPAC members

In order to fulfill the duties and responsibilities of the SEPAC as outlined in Article II of the SEPAC Bylaws, SEPAC members shall endeavor:

 To become familiar with the mandatory special education law, special education code, regulations and the Northwest Education Services' (North Ed) plan for special education.

2. To function as liaison between local districts and the North Ed.

- To cooperate with North Ed and its local districts in the development of the North
 Ed's plan and for the delivery of special education programs.
 - i. Be familiar with North Ed and local special education programs.
 - ii. Have frequent contact with local administrators in charge of special education.
 - iii. Bring needs, problems and concerns of persons with disabilities in local districts to the attention of North Ed.
 - Make recommendations for alteration of or additions to the North Ed's
 Special Education Plan to better meet the needs of the persons with
 disabilities.
 - v. Consider training in Surrogate Parenting.
- b. To keep local school boards informed with regard to special education.
 - i. Assist in interpreting the mandatory special education law for the local school districts.
 - ii. Explain support services for special education provided by the North Ed.
 - iii. Report progress and/or needs of local special education programs.

iv. Report on SEPAC activities.

3. To act as advisor to parents of local persons with disabilities.

- a. Through knowledge of special education and services, a SEPAC member may serve as a resource of information.
- b. SEPAC members may serve as advisors to parents at IEPT meetings.
- c. SEPAC members may initiate or encourage the organization of parents of persons with disabilities in local districts. SEPAC may invite parents from local districts to any and all SEPAC functions.
- d. SEPAC members maintain confidentiality and obtain proper permission to exchange information to advocate for specific students.
- e. SEPAC members adhere to the member's local board policy and guidelines.

4. To educate the public with regard to the mandatory special education law.

- a. To interpret and share information about local and intermediate special education programs and services.
- b. To relay information about local programs and services to school papers and newsletters.
- 5. SEPAC will keep up to date on local, state and national developments affecting students with disabilities.
